Interesting Facts

- Roman soldiers signed up for 25 years and were not allowed to marry.
- Julius Caesar twice unsuccessfully invaded Britain in 55 &54 BC.
- In 55 BC Julius Caesar invaded with 2 Legions (each legion consisted of 5000 men)
- In 55 BC he was unable to land his cavalry because of bad weather and many of his ships were wrecked. Despite establishing a beachhead he had to withdraw after repeated attacks on his army by the Celtic tribes.
- In 54 BC he brought 5 legions (25,000) of men and ensured his cavalry was with him.
- He fought many battles and effectively would have won but for unrest back in Gaul. So he negotiated a peace and left.
- Some Celtic tribes sided with the Romans.
- Julius Caesar introduced the Julian calendar which included leap years. It also included the month of July, which was named after him after his death
- Nearly 100 years later In AD 43 Emperor Claudius invaded with 5 Legions and a further 25,000 auxiliaries (Non-Roma soldiers).
- It took him nearly 30 years to conquer England and Wales completely.
- He is believed to have brought war elephants with him to terrify the enemy.
- Celtic warriors could be male or female.
- Boudica, Queen of the Iceni led a revolt against the Romans in AD 60.
- The Iceni tribe were based in East Anglia. Many of us may be descended from Iceni warriors.
- Both Caesar and Claudius were murdered. Caesar was stabbed 23 times by people he thought of as friends. Claudius was killed by his wife.
- Many of the cities of Britain were built by the Romans.
- London was originally named Londinium.
- The Roman soldiers built roads, many of which are the foundation of modern roads today.
- The Roman Emperor Hadrian ordered a wall built across the North of England to keep out the frocious Scots.

Chariot	A two-wheeled vehicle drawn by horses, used in ancient racing and warfare
