

What are SATs?

- At the end of Key Stage One (Y2) all children are required to be assessed in different areas of English and Maths.
- This takes the form of both teacher assessment and testing –
 SATs tests are just one piece of evidence.
- Throughout the year, Miss O'Dwyer, Mrs Lee and Mrs Copeman will be preparing the children for the tests.
- The tests inform Teacher Assessment that are submitted to the government at the end of the year.

When and how do the SATs take place?

- The school is required to administer SATs tests during the month of May.
- There is no set timetable for administering the tests; it can be decided upon by the school.
- If your child is absent, they will do the tests when they return. We
 do ask that you do not book any holidays during May as they will
 not be authorised.
- We aim to make SATs as non-threatening as possible. They take place in the classroom with your child's class teacher and other familiar adults.

SATs papers

- At the end of Year 2, children will sit tests in

- Reading
- > Punctuation, Grammar and Spelling (SPaG or GPaS)
- Mathematics

- There is no test for English writing as the judgement is made only through teacher assessment.

Results

- The government has provided assessment frameworks which teachers use to assess against.
- Currently, children in Reading, Writing and Maths will be assessed as
- ✓ Pre-Key Stage
- ✓ Working towards the expected standard
- ✓ Working at the expected standard
- ✓ Working at 'greater depth'
- In Science, children will be assessed as 'working at the expected standard' or not

Reading

- The Reading Test consists of two separate papers:
 - Paper 1 consists of a combined reading prompt and answer booklet. The paper includes a list of useful words and some practice questions for teachers to use to introduce the contexts and question types to pupils. The test takes approximately 30 minutes to complete, but is not strictly timed.
 - Paper 2 consists of an answer booklet and a separate reading booklet. There are no practice questions on this paper. Teachers can use their discretion to stop the test early if a pupil is struggling. The test takes approximately 40 minutes to complete, but is not strictly timed.
- The texts will cover a range of poetry, fiction and non-fiction.





Mathematics

- Children will sit two tests: Paper 1 and Paper 2:
- Paper 1: Arithmetic lasts approximately 20 minutes (but this is not strictly timed). It covers calculation methods for all operations.
- Paper 2: Reasoning lasts for approximately 35 minutes, which includes time for five aural questions. Pupils will still require calculation skills and questions will be varied including multiple choice, matching, true/false, completing a chart or table or drawing a shape. Some questions will also require children to show or explain their working out.


Maths Paper 1: Arithmetic



Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar

- The test consists of two separate papers:
 - Paper 1: Spelling pupils to spell 20 missing words within a test booklet. The test is expected to take approximately 15 minutes to complete, but is not strictly timed.
 - Paper 2: Grammar, Punctuation and Vocabulary a combined question and answer booklet focusing on pupils' knowledge of grammar, punctuation and vocabulary. Pupils will have approximately 20 minutes to complete the questions in the test paper, but it is not strictly timed.

Within the assessment, the spelling words are read out to the children to fill into the gaps within the sentences. In this example, the missing spelling words are: **sea**, **cave**, **bird** and **funny**.


Background Information

Interesting facts


- Food can be sorted into five groups: Bread, rice, potatoes and pasta; meat, fish, eggs and beans; milk and dairy; fruit and vegetables; food high in fat and sugar.
- Over half of a human's diet should come from 2 groups: bread, rice, potatoes and pasta; and fruit and vegetables.
- All animals need food, water and air to stay alive.
- Neil Armstrong was the first man to walk on the surface of the moon, followed by Buzz Aldrin in 1969.
- He was born in 1930 in the United States of America.
- The astronauts travelled to the moon in Apollo 11.
- Before travelling to the moon, Neil Armstrong was a university professor and a pilot.
- Armstrong famously said, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."
- Armstrong worked for NASA.
- He died in August 2012 aged 82.
- Wheeled vehicles use either a fixed or a rotating axle to move.
- The proper name for a moon buggy is a Lunar Rover.
- Lunar Rovers are powered by batteries.
- Two astronauts could ride in a Lunar Rover at a time.
- Astronauts have to train before their missions so they are fit and healthy – this includes a particular diet and exercise regime.
- An astronaut's diet consists of dehy drated food., this
 means they have to add water.

Supporting your child's learning at home



- Children in Year 2 should be reading regularly at home for at least 10-20 minutes an evening (or before school!) – including free readers.
- Talk about the story before, during and afterwards – discuss the plot, the characters, their feelings and actions, how it makes you feel, predict what will happen and encourage your child to have their own opinions. Remind them it's ok not to like a book!
- Visit the local library.

Supporting your child's learning at home

- Weekly spellings these words are 'common exception words', which cannot be spelled using phonics.
- These words lists are from the National Curriculum, and children are expected to be able to read most and spell many of them by the end of Year 2.

Don't panic!

- Whilst SATs are statutory, we assess your child's progress throughout the year.
- This means that the scores that your child achieves in the SATs are just one part of the assessment process.
- We prepare the children (without them knowing!) in lots of different ways including some afternoon support/challenge activities with Mrs Lee, Miss Clarey and Miss Pereira. The children really enjoy these!
- Your child's final end of year results are determined by the teacher and not the tests!
