- ⇒ Sugar cane is grown in countries such as the United States of America, Brazil, India and China.

Key Vocabulary

plant	A plant is a living thing that grows and makes new plants.
animal	A particular kind of living organism, one that can move voluntarily and can find and digest food.
farm	A piece of land used to grow crops and/or raise animals for produce.
arable farm	A farm that grows crops such as vegetables and wheat.
dairy farm	A farm that produces milk and dairy products.
pasture	Land with grass growing on it for farm animals to eat.
climate	The weather found in a certain place over a long period of time.
produce	Things made or grown in order to be sold.
plantation	A large piece of land, especially in a tropical country, where crops such as rubber, coffee, tea, or sugar are grown.
